Laptops At The Libraries



Laptop computers in Carlson Library may be borrowed for *four (4) hours* for use *within the building*. These are high demand items, so to avoid late fees or fines, please remember to return them on time. Fees for late laptop computers and power cords are \$2.50 per hour each (that is \$5.00 per hour for the pair). Don't forget that laptops are always due one (1) hour *before closing time*.

Laptop computers in Suhr Library at Venango College (Oil City Campus) may be borrowed for use in the library for four hours. However, they may also be checked out of the Suhr Library building for up to a 24 hour period. Ask the staff about this service.

As always, loans are based upon availability and positive identification with a Clarion ID card.

The laptop loan program is made possible by Student Technology Fees and the Center for Computing Services.

iPads At The Libraries



Carlson and Suhr Libraries have iPads that students may borrow for up to *one* (1) week.

Each iPad comes with a carrying case, power cord, protective cover, and is pre-loaded with basic apps. If you want to load additional apps, you can...as long as you create and use your own Apple ID account. iPads are reconfigured to the original state when returned to the Library. However, apps that you have purchased are yours, and can be downloaded again when you choose.

Once each semester, iPad borrowers are asked to read and sign an agreement that outlines what you need to know about borrowing an iPad:

• You can keep the iPad "package" for one week

- Late fees are \$25 per day
- Fees for damaged equipment may be assessed
- Lost iPads will cost you \$600
- Etc

As always, loans are based upon availability and positive identification with a Clarion ID card.

The Minion's Master Moves: More Eagle Dollars

We've told you that each student receives \$5 in Eagle Dollars pre-loaded to his or her Clarion University ID. But, what do you do when you've used up the \$5?

You've got choices!

- Add a *minimum of \$25* in Eagle Dollars anytime <u>online</u> using a credit card.
- Call or stop by the Center for Residence Life Services (they accept credit cards, cash, check, or money orders...again **\$25 minimum**).
- Add any amount of cash to an Eagle Dollars account at the "Value Add" machines located in the lower level of the Gemmell Student Center or Level A of the Carlson Library!
 - The "Value Add' machines accept \$1, \$5, \$10, or \$20 dollar bills. Whatever you deposit is added to the account...there is no change returned from these machines.

Employees can use Eagle Dollars too! Money added to an account using any of these methods is available immediately

Computer Tip: MS Excel Column Width Tip

For many reasons columns sometimes overlap. The usual resolution is to manually click between each column header (A, B, C, D, etc.) and drag them to a size that allows for the viewing of all information. The fastest way to do this when there are multiple columns involved is to use the AutoFit feature.

1. Select the multiple columns by clicking the first column letter to be resized (A, B, C, D, etc.).

- 2. Hold down the mouse button and dragging to the last column desired.
- 3. Place the mouse between two of the selected columns (any vertical line in the header row is fine).
- 4. When the double headed arrow is visible, double click the mouse to adjust **all** columns to the widest entry in **each** column.

If you have difficulty getting the double-headed arrow...

- 1. Click *Format* on the Menu bar
- 2. Select Column
- 3. Click AutoFit Selection
