  - Note: Standard messaging rates apply. Remember that SMS stands for Short Message Service. If the question (or answer) requires indepth discussion, you probably should contact the reference librarian using one of the other options.
- <u>LibAnswers</u> is an online reference service. This database of questions and answers that others have previously asked might have what you are looking for.
- Email is great when immediate feedback is not crucial or when the reference librarians are not on duty. Submit requests for assistance using our <u>Ask A Librarian</u> online reference form. It is available at the <u>Libraries</u> website, through the <u>Ask A Librarian</u> / <u>LibAnswers</u> link.

LexisNexis® Academic is an online database where you can find timely and critical news reports, legal resources, and business information. It has an easy-to-use interface and powerful research capabilities. There are "Hot Topics Links" on the search screen and links to research guides that will help you start, and complete, your assignment.

# The Minion's Master Moves: Open All Key Files At Once



If you work with multiple Excel workbooks at one time, save them as a *Workspace*. A workspace contains multiple workbooks, and they all open at the same time.

- Open all of the workbooks you want to use.
- 2. Go to the **View** tab in the **Window group**, and select the **Save Workspace** button. Give the workspace a file name, select a location, and click **Save**. Close all workbooks.



3. Go to the location where you saved the workspace file and double-click it. This will open all workbooks at once. Use the **Switch Windows** button in the **Window** group to toggle between workbooks.

# Tech Term: Cyberspace



Unlike most computer terms, "cyberspace" does not have a standard, objective definition. Instead, it is used to describe the virtual world of computers. For example, an object in cyberspace refers to a block of data floating around a computer system or network. With the advent of the Internet, cyberspace now extends to the global network of computers. Therefore, after sending an e-mail

to your friend, you could say you sent the message to her through cyberspace. However, use this term sparingly, as it is a popular newbie term and is well overused.

The word "cyberspace" is credited to William Gibson, who used it in his book, *Neuromancer*, written in 1984. Gibson defines cyberspace as...

"...a consensual hallucination experienced daily by billions of legitimate operators, in every nation, by children being taught mathematical concepts... A graphical representation of data abstracted from the banks of every computer in the human system. Unthinkable complexity. Lines of light ranged in the non-space of the mind, clusters and constellations of data" (New York: Berkley Publishing Group, 1989), pp. 128.
