If you need help at a time when the reference librarians are not on duty, try our Ask A Librarian/LibAnswers online reference service. It's a database of questions and answers that others have previously asked. It just might have what you are looking for. It is available at the Libraries' website in the right column.

If that doesn't fit your need, you may submit requests via email by clicking on the e-mail link on the LibAnswers page. You also have the option to submit a request to the Ask Here PA service, which provides 24/7 assistance by librarians at other libraries around the world.

Library Tip: Protect Your Valuables

The S.W.A.T. Minion's Tip: Making The Move



Many students are moving soon. If you have a desktop computer, here are some reminders for safely getting it to its new home:

Back up your documents! Stuff happens. Always prepare for the worst case scenario.

Make sure it is completely powered down. Moving parts like fans, CD/DVD recorders, and hard drives need at least ten seconds to shut down. Give everything a chance to stop before moving anything.

Use the computer's original box. If you didn't keep it, get another box, and try to provide as much cushioning as the manufacturer used. If you don't use a box, keep this in mind...

Never set your PC upright in a seat or on the floor of your car. Your beloved digital friend doesn't have a car seat in case you come to a sudden stop. You can use seatbelts to secure your PC in a vehicle, but you can more easily lay your PC's case flat on the floor of your car. The same also goes for your monitor, which is dangerous (for itself and your head) when airborne for short distances.

Use your towel. If your PC has to ride on top of a surface that might scratch your case, wrap your PC in a towel or blanket to protect its finish.
