Where do I find these journals?

You can access most of them by going to the Library Web page and clicking on the Journals/Magazines A-Z link. There you can search either for a specific title or browse the list by title or subject categories.

The Databases A-Z link provides information and access to all the databases the Library subscribes to, and contains links to the majority of the journals available. Two databases that include thousands of academic journals and have easy search access are *Academic Search Complete* and *ProQuest Direct*. Most other databases have a subject focus, which may be of interest to you too.



## COMPUTER TIP: AVOID REINVENING THE WHEEL



Excel makes it very easy for new users to use advanced worksheets without creating them manually. This is done by using "Templates." Let's say that there is a need to submit an expense report. Instead of creating one from the beginning, use the existing Expense Report Template.

- 1. Click File on the *Menu* bar and select *New*. Select the location to find the templates.
- 2. Type a keyword to search for the template that best suits your needs, such as "Expense" (without the quotes).
- 3. Select the desired template from the list, fill in the blanks, and save.
